Dear Friends:

For many of us, the Fall season is shaped by the ordinary joys of children returning to school, church programs starting up after summer respite, and on the horizon, the anticipated joys of holiday planning and Thanksgiving. Amidst these reliable markers of the season I write simply to say thank you, for making Presbyterian Disaster Assistance a priority out of many opportunities to give and serve. Your gift is deeply needed and greatly appreciated, and I am privileged to speak this word of gratitude on behalf of those for whom your generosity brings renewed hope and joy in the wake of disaster and its aftermath.

Throughout south Texas and parts of Florida, children's back-to-school rituals were abruptly halted by the winds and floods of back-to-back Category 4 hurricanes Harvey and Irma. Some schools won't reopen this year at all, and many children, their houses ruined and family livelihood impacted, will try to find a place to learn hundreds of miles from home. As we plan harvest festivals, massive flooding and landslides has put at risk the farming livelihood of people in Sierra Leone and Bangladesh, and drought has gripped South Sudan and neighboring countries in relentless famine. An early onset of fire season in the drought-stricken west has brought an extra layer of anxiety and responsibility to communities seeking resilience and recovery. And yet...into these hard situations and many more, you have stepped with your prayers, your gifts, and your time, because <u>your</u> ordinary days are shaped by an awareness of the extraordinary love of God, who calls us to bring hope out of chaos. As the book of James tells us, every generous act of giving, with every perfect gift, is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change. (James 1:17).

Salt & Light recently opened a location in Urbana, complete with a thrift shop, a full grocery store and coffee shop! The funds we raise will help stock their grocery shelves and feed the hungry. Salt & Light is unique, in that it is built upon the premise of non-toxic charity. Their goal is to enable people to lift themselves out of poverty, while providing dignity to the individual. Thus, while Salt & Light does help individuals in an extreme emergency with food needs, individuals generally purchase items in their grocery store with cash or with credits earned through volunteering at are nonprofits. UPDATES

- The CU Men's Emergency Shelter opened on November 20th. Our church has representation on the board, as Kristi Corbin is a board member. Exciting developments have included the addition of a washer and dryer to launder bedclothes and a donated refrigerator! These amenities have greatly enhanced the program. The program is still in need of church groups to take snacks responsibilities for a week at a time. They can either provide funds to purchase shelf stable snacks, or can physically provide the snacks themselves. In addition, volunteers are needed to help sanitize the mattresses twice per week. Would you like to volunteer? Contact the associate pastor of Faith United Methodist Church. His name is Rev. Corey Blackwell and his email address is cory@champaignfaith.org. To refer someone who is homeless, let them know that the shelter is at New Covenant Church, nightly registration starts at 8:30pm, and up to 30 men can sleep there per night.
- The FPCC Missions SAFE House psychology class continues to meet this fall. Kristi is exploring with SAFE House staff how to proceed with classes in the coming year with the upcoming retirement of Brother Green, who has served as the head of SAFE House for almost two decades.

- We are now in our final year of funding from the Forward 150 Mission Fund. The DREAAM House project led by our former mission coordinator, Tracy Dace, was recently approved to receive \$20,000 for the third year in a row from the fund. Tracy's innovative program helps boys from preschool age to elementary age, with plans to support the children with programs all the way to college. The major goal of the program is educational success. The program is showing promising results in both educational and social-emotional growth.
- The installation of a Mission Kiosk in Westminster Hall has been approved by Mission Team and Building and Grounds. The Kiosk will consist of a touch screen monitor that is accessible to those standing or those in wheelchairs, a small computer housed unseen on the back of the monitor that will allow Kristi to update the presentations on the monitor regularly, a new board on which to hang posters and flyers, and a freestanding brochure display. It is Kristi's hope that we can have the kiosk up and running in January.
