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Egypt Onward: An Update from Steve and Cinda Gorman, Former PC(USA) Mission Co-Workers

Feb. 19, 2013 - Dec. 11, 2015 - residence, Cairo, Egypt: nearly three wonderful, amazing, blessed years working with the Evangelical (Protestant) Presbyterian Churches and seminary of the Synod of the Nile. Is it over? *Not!*

Dec. 12, 2015 on....we both found ourselves still involved in the outreach of the Synod of the Nile.

Steve traveled to Egypt three times to continue on a volunteer basis in his RL (Regional Liaison) position. Twice he went alone, and in May with Cinda, so they could both enjoy graduation among their student and faculty friends at Evangelical School of Theology in Cairo (ETSC http://etsc.org/).



In September, each of us drove vans for 21 days, ferrying six Egyptians and their rapidly accumulating shopping purchases on a PCUSA study tour from Louisville to Philly. All the learning, sharing, laughing and worshiping proved to be very meaningful in churches, seminaries and our General Assembly headquarters.

How "far away" is our past to our present? A heartbeat. We continue to pray for and think often of our colleagues up-and-down the Nile. Steve will return the last two week of this May 2017 to orient the new Missions Area Coordinator, visit with good friends and, yes, enjoy the ETSC graduation!

Then come July, Steve will be at Big Tent in Saint Louis (see https://www.pcusa.org/events/40270/big-tent-2017/). At Big Tent, Steve will attend a meeting of the Egypt Partnership Network that will be held simultaneously.

LOUISVILLE – Organizers of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) Big Tent 2017 event have assembled a list of seven "Fast Facts" for those attending, or considering attending, the July 6-8 gathering in St. Louis on the campus of Washington University.

With the theme of "Race, Reconciliation and Reformation," Big Tent offers Presbyterians an opportunity to discern some of the toughest concerns of the day while actively engaging with their faith community and people of faith in St. Louis.

The preacher at opening worship will be PC(USA) Stated Clerk the Rev. Dr. J. Herbert Nelson II. The

Fast Fact #1: What is Big Tent?

Big Tent is a Presbyterian conference where people of all ages gather for worship, learning and getting to know other Presbyterians. Those attending past Big Tents say they value the opportunity to network, socialize and build community with other Presbyterians.

Fast Fact #2: Who attends Big Tent?

Teaching elders, ruling elders, members of congregations, mid-council staff... you name it. Big tent is for Presbyterians interested in worshiping and learning alongside others!

The first three Big Tent conferences were held in hotels. In response to requests to make Big Tent more affordable and provide a more relaxed atmosphere where participants can easily gather in community, Big Tent 2015 was held on a college campus.

Big Tent 2017 wants to build on that experience and is again holding the conference on a university campus. St. Louis is easily reached by a variety of methods of transportation, particularly for those in the Midwest, and Presbyterians in the area are already planning for the 223rd General Assembly.

Fast Fact #6: Why was Big Tent created?







Mission Team is Discerning a Vision for a Mission Kiosk.

The following is a summary of the initial ideas after our first discussion/meeting. The kiosk would be a physical structure with multiple sides to it in Westminster Hall in the general area of the Mission Tables. The kiosk would have one human in it each Sunday to answer questions between services. Sometimes that human would be the Missions

Coordinator. Normally, that human would be a person directly organizing the mission work/events going on at that time. The physical structure and information should be accessible to adults and children, and have appealing information for both. The kiosk would be important to **attract new church members and Missions participants**. It will, just as importantly, serve to provide an avenue to **deepen the knowledge of and participation in Missions for current members**. Information presented would include up to date information on changes in ministries we support (such as agency updates/mission co-worker newsletters). This undertaking will require organization of volunteers, organization of information, and creative ideas of how to get traffic flow over to the kiosk. **These three tasks would be a part of the Mission Coordinator's position.**

Do you have any ideas about the Missions Kiosk? Please submit your recommendations to your Mission Committee's leader. That leader will report them to Mission Team at the next meeting. As the vision becomes more clearly formulated, we will consult about the feasibility of these ideas with all appropriate committees (such as Building and Grounds and Technology). Ultimately, the proposal will go to Session for consideration and vote. It will take several months to get to that phase. Meanwhile, please pray for the Holy Spirit to lead and guide our discussions and recommendations in the months to come. May God be glorified in the outcome.
