## Pastor's Pen

The evening of the 27th of April I attended the STAR Awards event at the Hilton Garden Inn. STAR stands for Service Together Achieves Results. It is presented by the City of Champaign, the Neighborhood Advisory Board, and Anthony Antoine, News Anchor, WCIA 3.

I was present to receive an award on behalf of our church community, First Presbyterian of Champaign. Our award fell under the category of Community Partner. In addition to our community stood Faith United Methodist and the United Way for agreeing to serve as the host locations for the 2017 Men's Emergency Shelter. We served the homeless men's population from Sunday through Thursday evenings while Faith United Methodists opened their facility Friday and Saturday evenings. It worked well for both of our schedules.

This came about when, in 2016, the community lost all emergency beds for homeless men. The Counsel of Service Providers to the Homeless (CSPH) began seeking options for shelter in the summer of 2016 with a goal of having shelter available by winter. Our Session was approached and requested to consider being a partner in this effort and after discussion voted to do so.

As I stood in front of so many others doing their part to respond to human need and raise the quality of life in our community, I felt proud on behalf of all of you who honored

God in this effort. The Psalmist, wrestling with the injustice and suffering in this life writes, "The needy shall not always be forgotten, nor the hope of the poor perish forever" (*Psalm 9:18*).

Caring for and redeeming people is God's business. We are all familiar with Jesus' words from *Matthew 25:37-40*. In Jesus' parable of 'The Great Judgment', the king responds to the question, "When was it we that we saw you hungry and a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing?" by saying, "Truly I tell you just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me".

I was impressed by the many people, churches, individuals, and organizations responding to the needs of the community. One sees the Holy Spirit moving peoples' hearts to care that "The needy shall not always be forgotten, nor the hope of the poor perish forever".

Paul reminds us that our hospitality and compassion encompasses not just people 'out there', but those among us as well. Responding to human need takes persistence and hard work. Listen to what he tells the Galatians; "So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up. So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all, and

especially for those of the family of faith" (*Galatians 6:9-10*).

We are given an opportunity in our family of faith to receive many immigrants from Africa. They make up the majority of our Sunday School and celebrate worship each Saturday evening in Centennial. As we are all one in Christ, we show hospitality and do "what is right", looking for opportunities as God brings them to us and directs us to meet needs and give people hope.

Along that line I would encourage you all to join Courageous Conversation on Tuesday, May 30, to meet and listen to **Dr. Daniel Carroll**, a professor at Wheaton College. There will be a workshop from 12-2 in Westminster entitled "Discovering God's Heart for Migrants in the Bible". There will be a light lunch served.

That evening from 6:30-8 PM Dr. Carroll will speak on the question, "Can the Bible Help Us with Immigration?" The evening event will be held in our sanctuary. This is an important and timely topic today.

We do "what is right" for people through ESL and the many ministries that give support and life to those in our midst. I think of **Kristi Corbin** teaching SAFE House psychology classes, giving hope to that population, as well as those of us who just returned from a visit to our partner church, Luyano Presbyterian, in Havana,

Cuba. Their hope is renewed by knowing that other Christians care and are there to meet needs when requested. That relationship is reciprocal as well. We have become a family united in Christ. I felt that bond particularly as I was asked to baptize two Cuban men that I knew from previous trips.

And, of course, Mission Possible ventures out for their 26<sup>th</sup> trip to Camp Carew. Their presence and work encourages the camp and provides improved grounds and facilities to the campers soon to arrive for summer camping weeks.

The ministry is alive and the days are full. Enjoy the blessings God is giving you and let us all remember to discover God in the needy, bring hope, and never grow weary in well doing.

## **Sunday School News**

We are continuing the theme of God's word to build upon what the children learned last semester. Jesus has left us to return to heaven in our timeline of study. We will now turn our focus to the words of the apostle Paul.

In April we studied the Lord's Supper. A special celebration of the Lord's Supper was held to conclude our unit of study on April 23. All of the Sunday School children in attendance on April 30 were in worship to share the experience of communion with the greater congregation.

Our last unit for the academic year will be a study of the letters of Paul to the early churches. We will see how God's word made a transformation in Paul and is still at work today. Our academic year of Sunday school will conclude on May 21.

The high school class is beginning a study called *Together We Triumph: Youth Response to Disaster* in preparation for helping in a natural disaster recovery effort. This is important spiritual training to help us encounter Christ at work in the lives of victims and the people who are trying to help them. Participants are invited to

wrestle with the big questions that follow every disaster. Was this punishment for some sin? Why didn't God prevent this from happening? I want to help, but what should I say that will be truly comforting and not make things worse? We have a great group of young people meeting regularly for brunch and discussion at 10:30-11:30 AM Sundays on the second floor of the education building.

We need summer teachers for the month of June! Can't commit during the academic year, but might have some time in summer? The children need you! The plan is to attend children's church in the chapel and then enjoy some activities in the park afterward on nice days. Ever played Jail tag? We will teach you! Paul and Silas may get thrown in jail, but we have earthquakes to set them free. It is a fun way to reinforce Bible stories and God's message for us.

# A Change Is Coming... Again

The Gathering, our Contemporary Service, is moving to 10:30 AM on Sunday mornings; we will continue to meet in Centennial Hall. This may seem odd. If you recall, we used to have the service at 10:30, there are many reasons why we are moving back to 10:30. We love the newly remodeled Centennial Hall and want to continue experiencing relaxed worship there. However, the 9 o'clock time is not working.

One of the main reasons is that our pastors are stressed by the demands of concurrent services. Each week, they're running (sometimes literally) up and down the stairs to make it in time and both services suffer. Another important consideration has been the regular attendees to The Gathering that could no longer attend at 9; our average weekly attendance has dropped in half.

Offering different worship styles is important for the growth and future of FPC. Offering an informal worship service where un-churched (and de-churched) can feel comfortable is important for the growth and future of FPC. Offering families an opportunity to worship together in a nontraditional setting is important for the growth and future of FPC.

Beginning June 4, The Gathering will move back to 10:30 AM in Centennial Hall. We are also incorporating Family Friendly Worship into our contemporary service. We will have more involvement in the actual worship service by young people (reading, ushering, etc.) as we grow and have interested participants. Beginning immediately, we will have a "Prayground," an area in the worship space, with quiet kid-friendly activities.

This encourages children to be in worship as they are comfortable, while not disturbing other worshippers. This is the future of our church!

## **Financial Update**




#### **Contributions**


Contributions in April were \$10K more than 2016 and \$12K over the budget at \$84K. The Year to Date total continues strong in 2017. This exceeded last year by \$67K and the budgeted amount by \$55K. The increase in this year's contributions continue to offset the decrease in prepaid pledges (those paid in the year prior to the pledge year) for 2017 compared to 2016. These prepaid pledges are prorated over the year with 1/12 added to each month's contributions.

#### **Expenses**

Year-to-date expenses are right at budget at \$334K and \$22K below 2016. Considering all sources, revenue exceeds expenses by \$79K more than at this time in 2016. This figure includes a \$29K transfer from other funds that was not made last year.

# How Did You Get Here?

#### The Diversity Immigrant Lottery

About 160 people from Central Africa actively participate in worship and ministries of First Presbyterian Church. Most are immigrants with Permanent Legal Resident status obtained through "the lottery."

Section 203(c) of the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA) provides for a class of immigrants known as "diversity immigrants," from countries with historically low rates of immigration to the United States. This program administered by the State Department is often called the green card lottery or the D-Visa.

Fifty thousand visas are available each fiscal year, distributed among six geographic regions. Africa is one of the six eligible regions. To be eligible an adult must have at least a high school education or have worked for two years in an occupation that requires at least two years of training. Candidates must satisfy health, criminal

background requirements and prove they have a means of support in the United States. In 2015 there were 9,388,986 applicants and 0.88% were selected. There were 4,943 selected from The Democratic Republic of the Congo.

Winners of the lottery must pay their own transportation costs to the United States and arrange for a host family pledged to support them financially. They are not eligible for any US government cash support but are eligible for Permanent Legal Resident (green card) status. Children attend public schools and both children and pregnant women receive health care benefits through Medicaid. After five years of residency a Permanent Legal Resident can apply for US citizenship giving them the rights and obligation of every other US citizen.

Most of the Western African members of our congregation are D-Visa lottery winners. Others are political asylum seekers or refugees.
