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From the Mission Coordinator:

Thanks to everyone who has been submitting ideas to Mission Team for inclusion in the proposal for the **Mission Kiosk**. We are making progress, and I expect we should go to appropriate committees to further develop these ideas by July.

Our church has had a longstanding relationship with the Canaan S.A.F.E. (Substance Abuse Free Environment) House since its inception in the 1990's. The S.A.F.E. House is a faith based recovery program for individuals who have been addicted to substances. While the program has traditionally served men, it recently opened a women's S.A.F.E. House as well. Last year, I was asked by Pastor Tatum (who heads Canaan Baptist Church) to teach a Positive Psychology/ Applied Psychology class for those enrolled in the program. After a pilot test and then Session approval, I began teaching the class regularly in the fall of 2016 as a part of my position. We ended our first "academic" year in May, and had a graduate from Women's SAFE House who had attended 27 of the classes by the time she graduated! Because the participants continue to report that this class is helpful for their personal development, we continue to meet every two weeks this summer. We expect to resume regular weekly meetings in the fall.

Per the request of Tracy Dace, director of the DREAAM House, I had the honor of guest teaching/training staff and volunteers this past week. We discussed research about the brain as well as research based techniques that can assist in helping children overcome adversity to become more resilient. Would **you like to serve** at the DREAAM House? See page 3.

I have been asked to continue serving as a representative of our congregation to the Interfaith Men's Emergency Shelter, as they continue to develop ways to intervene to keep people safe during the harsh winter months. I will keep the congregation updated on this important issue. If you haven't seen the award from the city for our participation in the Emergency Shelter this winter, it now sits in the office on top of the Mission Mailboxes. (If you are a leader of a mission committee and haven't checked your committee's mailbox in a while, now you have some extra motivation to do so. :-)) See page 8 for more information about this initiative.

Mission Possible Work Trip Report of May 14-19, 2017 to Camp Carew Submitted by: Harry Bremer

Mission Possible **had its 26**th **trip** on May 14-19. We went to our Presbytery camp, Camp Carew, in the Marion-Carbondale area. Our mission was to build open cabinets and bunk beds for eight rooms in the **McNabb cabin**. (The cabin was converted from an open area to 8 small rooms.)

Most of the supplies were purchased ahead of time; much of the wood was cut and painted (primed) before we left for camp. We initially worked at two sites – one being the maintenance building, where further sawing and painting was done for the beds. Pieces for the storage units were made, painted, and the units constructed.

All the above was transported to the McNabb cabin. Cabinets were installed. Construction was started on the bunk beds which took several days. Final touches (including painting) was complete by the final day.

In addition, boards for coat hangers were cut, painted, and installed. New trim was nailed in the rooms and new hallway. The hallway was painted. New powered exit signs replaced the old ones.

Morning devotions used the book "Dare to Journey with Henri Nouwen" by Charles Ringma. The book is a collection of 180 reflections. Each person spoke on one of the reflections and its related Bible verse.



Update on the Interfaith Men's Emergency Shelter

The shelter's inception and success is truly a community collaborative effort, made possible by local donations and support as well as the united effort of the Council of Service Providers to the Homeless Emergency Shelter Development Team. This past winter, the shelter was only open only one week shy of three months.

In that time, we:



- Provided 1,692 safe, dry, warm beds in three different facilities: Faith United Methodist, First Presbyterian Church of Champaign, and New Covenant Fellowship.
 - 2. Served an average of 20 men per night.
 - 3. Sheltered 111 different community members.
 - 4. Hired six different employees to manage the shelter, including one gentleman who utilized the shelter.

Going forward, we are set up and ready to go seven days a week at New Covenant Fellowship, December 1st to March 31st, if we can raise \$50,000. We are in the process of setting up an Interfaith Non Profit that will help us provide winter shelter for 2 to 5 years until another local ministry or agency can take over -- possibly year round. We are hoping that faith groups involved in the Interfaith Alliance and/or the Habitat for Humanity Interfaith Build will consider joining this effort and non-profit so that we can keep this effort moving forward.
