Congratulations On 100 Years---Some Reflections

As we reflect upon this significant 100th anniversary celebration with you our focus immediately turns to God. For 100 years this has been God's ministry. All ministry is initiated by God's Holy Spirit. We sing it in the words of that great hymn, "The Church's One Foundation"; "The church's one foundation is Jesus Christ her Lord; She is his new creation by water and the word; From heaven he came and sought her to be his holy bride; With his own blood he bought her, and for her life he died".

God through Jesus Christ invites us to participate in what God is doing in God's reconciling work in the world through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. We are in Cuba with you today to honor your faithfulness to Christ's work by which you have and are continuing to glorify God.

Financial Update




Contributions

Contributions in May were \$32K less than 2016 and \$29K below the budget at \$43K. Despite this dip in contributions this past month, the Year to Date total continues positive in 2017. This exceeded last year by \$35K and the budgeted amount by \$26K. The increase in this year's contributions continue to offset the decrease in prepaid pledges (those paid in the year prior to the pledge year) for 2017 compared to 2016. These prepaid pledges are prorated over the year with 1/12 added to each month's contributions.

Expenses

Year to Date expenses are right at budget at \$418K and \$4K below 2016. Considering all sources, revenue exceeds expenses by \$74K and by \$31K more than at this time in 2016. This figure includes a \$29K transfer from other funds that was not made last year.





DREAAM House


DREAAM House is in need of gift cards to local grocery stores or financial help in providing swim passes for the boys.

Conversation Partner: A New Program in C-U

Would you like to meet an adult neighbor from a different country to learn about their culture and life? Do you enjoy making friends? Do you have a full calendar with limited availability. Is English your native language? Then, you might want to be a Conversation Partner.

Conversation Partners talk with an adult English learner weekly for an hour. You will meet with your partner in a public place like a coffee shop or public library.

The program will work with learners who are active in local congregations such as ours. You would be matched to a learner in our congregation and work out the meeting schedule.

Learners will be able to converse in English, and be able to make friends while practicing English with the encouragement of a native speaker.

Community volunteers and I will match you to someone of similar interests when possible, provide an orientation for you and give you some conversation starters. We will also be available monthly if you want to share your joys and concerns.

How Did You Get Here? Asylum Seekers

While most of our African friends are Permanent Legal Residents (green card) or United States Citizens, others are asylum seekers. "When people flee their own country and seek sanctuary in another country, they apply for asylum – the right to be recognized as a refugee and receive legal protection and material assistance. An asylum seeker must demonstrate that his or her fear of persecution in his or her home country is well-founded."¹

An asylum seeker must prove eligibility for refugee status meaning there is not protection in the country of citizenship because of race, nationality, religion, political opinion or membership in a particular group. An asylum seeker may not work and does not receive government cash benefits (eg food stamps). When an application for asylum has not been acted on by our State Department in 150 days, a temporary work permit is given. Should the applicant receive refugee status then public support is available as for every other refugee. Permanent legal resident status is possible one year after refugee status is recognized. Citizenship is possible four years later. If refugee status is not awarded then the applicant does have not status under immigration law and is subject to deportation.

Because of the trauma of persecution and necessity to flee, the long period without work status, ineligibility for public benefits and the risk of deportation, asylum seekers are among the most vulnerable in our community.
