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ESL Classes Offer More than English Lessons

Language and culture go together. One must become "fluent in the culture" to communicate well and precisely. One must learn the nuances of a given language to truly understand the heart of a culture. Our English classes are so much more than just vocabulary building or conversation practice. Beyond culture and language are relationships. I would like to share a few examples:

- 1. K was a young woman from Japan who joined one of our conversation groups. She attended class for a few months and then left our program about a year ago. I thought perhaps she had returned to Japan. However, last week she came by to say good-bye to me (as I prepare to retire soon). She had heard about my retirement from some of her student friends. Then she shared the good news that she was pregnant, and that G, her ESL friend from Brazil, will have a baby in August. How did K know this? She had G had stayed in touch for all the months since K left our group. A strong and lasting friendship across geography was formed in our little conversation group. Continuing good feelings brought K back for a visit last week.
- 2. Z is a quiet, devout Muslim woman who regularly comes to class. She had gotten to know Gloria Read, who helped with our daily snack time until she broke her ankle and began a long, slow recovery following ankle surgery. Z inquired about Gloria, sent at least one card, and has visited Gloria in her assisted living facility in which she is living temporarily. Care and concern reach beyond the language barriers because first there is a relationship.

As I step down from the ESL Coordinator position, I, like Jesus' mother Mary, find myself gathering all these memories and treasuring them in my heart. There are so many memories, so many lovely people, so many "cultural moments" that needed a little more language, and so many awkward conversations that need a little more cultural understanding. However, mostly I remember the people-moments...the many and varied relationships. Such is the way God works in and through us.

"Rock bottom" is not a term one usually associates with Bob Rice. He and his wife Kristi have been mission co-workers in the Democratic Republic of Congo since 2010. They met in Rwanda in 2003 and their love of missions runs deep. Currently, they are helping to get a savings and loan program off the ground in Congo. Many women, children, and families could find a way out of unimaginable poverty.

When one reads all of the amazing things Bob and Kristi have done, it is hard to imagine a time when Bob was not a follower of Christ. He describes a time in 1995 when he wasn't sure he believed in God. He was reckless, anxious, and resigned to a life of depression. He even read about Hindu beliefs and mysticism, to no avail. His soul felt dark and uncertain.

A week later Bob returned to Colorado and he encountered a man, Stan Wagner, who asked him if he believed in Jesus Christ. He described looking into Stan's eyes and finding one thing - "love." Stan had been in prison when he gave his life to Jesus. God used Stan to bring Bob to Jesus and has used Bob to

He allows God to use him to make a huge impact on the other side of the world. He was at one time lonely, depressed, worldly, lost, without faith, at "rock bottom." 

- Painting two bathhouse interiors and installing doors on the toilets.

- 8. Bill Gamble repaired rocking chairs with new "rockers."



2015 Back-to-School Week

Salt & Light needs our help again this summer with school supplies as students prepare to head back to school in the fall. This year, in keeping with the ideas in the book *Toxic Charity*, students and their parents will be able to buy their supplies at Two Trees Thrift Store at Salt & Light at a greatly discounted cost rather than just being given a filled backpack. Parents will be able to pay for supplies out of their own pocket as well as earning credit by volunteering at any non-profit organization in town. They can purchase the supplies their child needs and fit them to their student's likes. Two Trees is open to any family that needs help getting supplies to go back to school. Any proceeds from this year's Back to School Week will go towards supplies for next year's event.

Big Tent is coming July 30-August 1! This year's event will be on the University of Tennessee (at Knoxville) Campus. If space is still available, the fees are now \$450 per person. Our Relocation Ministry is focused on new immigrants moving to their first American home (who are affiliated with First Presbyterian Church or referred by the Refugee Center). Our goal is to give the families a place to sleep and the basics to prepare and eat a meal in their new home. Currently our storage unit is depleted. But, the need has not diminished. If you can help by giving things you no longer need or talking to family and friends who may be reducing clutter, then there are a number of young families who will be very grateful. Please continue to pray for our neighbors beginning new lives in a very strange place.

Please take products to mission closet across from the chapel or call Bob to arrange pick up at your home. All gifts donated can trigger a letter from ECIRMAC that then can be used to claim them for purposes of taxable income reduction.

Bedroom:

Mattresses twin, full or queen. Bed linens twin, full or queen. No kings please. Pillows and mattress covers Dressers or small bookcases and shelves for closet storage Laundry baskets

Bath: Towels Shower curtains Soap dish Kitchen: Dining table and chairs (Units are small so think apartment size) Eating utensils, plates, cups, water glasses Table covers (many of our donated table tops are damaged) Cookware and common cooking and serving utensils Rice cookers Kitchen towels Microwave (no large appliances)

Other: Table lamps End or coffee tables Sofas LR chairs (think apartment size) Basic tools such as hammer, screw drivers, wrenches, hooks, adhesive wall hangers Basic cleaning items electric vacuum, broom, dust pan, water bucket.

Avoid:

Please avoid gourmet cooking things, electric appliances (except rice cookers) or other fancy stuff. Please no clothing or accessories.

Have you heard about Amazon Smile?

Amazon Smile is an easy and free way to support missions!

How does AmazonSmile work?

"When first visiting AmazonSmile, customers are prompted to select a charitable organization from almost one million eligible organizations. In order to browse or shop at AmazonSmile, customers must first select a charitable organization. For eligible purchases at AmazonSmile, the AmazonSmile Foundation will donate 0.5% of the purchase price to the customer's selected charitable organization." (source: smile.amazon.com website)

Start at <u>http://www.firstchurchchampaign.org/amazon</u>. Select *First Presbyterian Church of Champaign* as your charitable organization. After you do this, all eligible purchases you make will then be totaled by Amazon, and 0.5% of the purchase price will be donated by Amazon to the First Presbyterian Church of Champaign account. *Make sure that you start future purchases either by clicking again from our church webpage or going directly to smile.amazon.com.* Doing so will ensure that each eligible purchase you make on Amazon will count toward the fundraising for Mission work.

How is this money used?

Just like Schnucks, we use this money to benefit food deliveries. As many of you know, with the help of Empty Tomb who facilitates this program, volunteers from our church deliver food to area individuals and families in need. We don't have a line item in the budget which fully funds this program. The Schnucks and Amazon Smile programs help cover the costs.

What if you don't shop at Amazon Smile or Schnucks and you still want to support food deliveries?

As with any ministry of our church, if you want to support what is being done, you are encouraged to pray for it. If you have funds above your normal support of the church that you wish to be donated to this ministry work, you can make a check out to the church. Be sure to note in the memo line that it is to be allocated to Food Delivery.

Why haven't you heard more about Amazon Smile?

Amazon has strict rules about how we can share information about Amazon Smile. We are, at this time, only able to promote it through electronic means. So, you can see information about it on Facebook and on the church website, but I can't print this page or do a Minute for Mission about it.
