The 2015 Raindrop Mission Project

Jesus is the Way Prison Ministries in Rantoul, Illinois

As it is with rain drops, one drop makes little difference in sustenance to the earth. Our congregation's support for mission work is similar to the rain drop. Individually, we may think that our contribution is of little value; but combined with others, our individual contributions have had a tremendous impact on the community. Often an agency will tell us that we are

one of their primary supporters. These agencies that we support (even with our regular annual support) often exist on a "shoe string." At the end of the year, they have little, if any, funds left to make needed improvements. Our Rain Drop project addresses that need. Each year we select the needs of one agency for a one-time infusion of resources to help one of their greatest needs.

Our 2015 Project

The selected project for 2015 is the replacement of a dilapidated lien-to structure that houses the refrigeration for the kitchen at the Jesus is the Way Prison Ministries facilities. The estimated cost is \$6,000 for materials. Our Mission Possible volunteers have agreed to supply the labor.

Why "Jesus is the Way Prison Ministries?"

With Jesus is the Way Prison Ministries (JWPM), it's all about saving the lives of men who have just been released from prison. Approximately 47% of all paroled prisoners eventually return to crime and to prison. Some have little desire to change. Others want to change, but do not have the skill set to live a normal productive life or the skills to obtain and keep a job. Individuals in this latter group are encouraged to complete applications to JWPM. *Only 17% of the JWPM graduates return to crime, far better than the typical 47%.*

The recruits enter a new environment of Christian values and what it means to love. In addition, there are other mandatory classes on anger management, domestic violence, and money management. Volunteering opportunities are

another important aspect. Learning how to get and keep a job is another practical need. Many of the area businesses support the program by providing jobs before they leave the program. Our church has supported this program for several years.

Support is simple. On June 7th or 14th, select from the board in Westminster Hall a raindrop that matches the amount of your contribution and hand it with a check to the smiling faces waiting at a table nearby. A check for any amount (whether it matches a raindrop amount or not) will also be welcomed.

Rev. Dr. Ofelia Ortega's Schedule

Rev. Dr. Ofelia Ortega is an immediate past President of the World Council of Churches and a current elected member of the Cuba National Assembly. A former Rector of the Ecumenical Protestant Seminary in Matanzas, she is also a current professor there. She is the first woman ordained as a protestant pastor in Cuba and Latin America, as well as a world-renowned pioneer in the field of feminist theology. More recently, Rev. Dr. Ortega was involved in the formation of an organic farming cooperative of thirty families near Matanzas.
