The Triennium theme is “GO,” and seeks to inspire and prepare youth long after the event itself, and encourage them to go back into the world to live out their faith and calling.



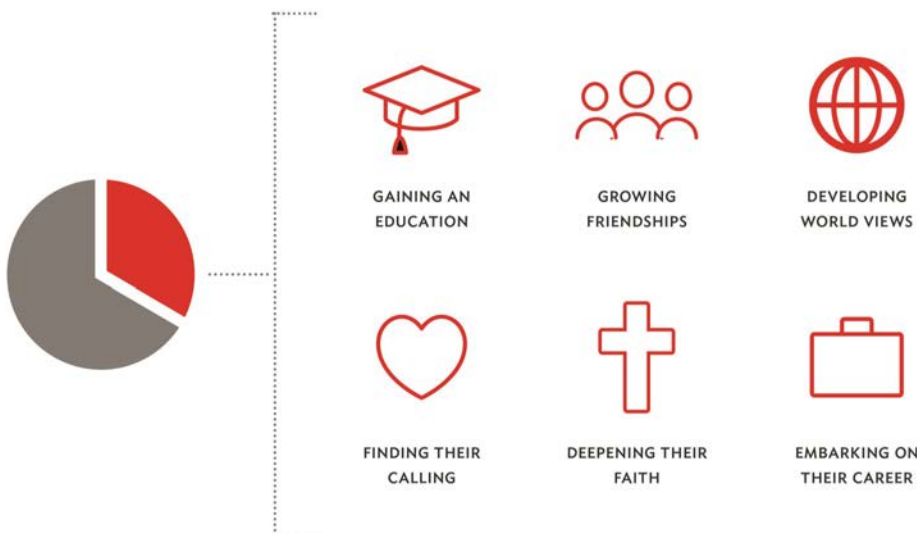
More than 5,000 youth and young adults attend Triennium.

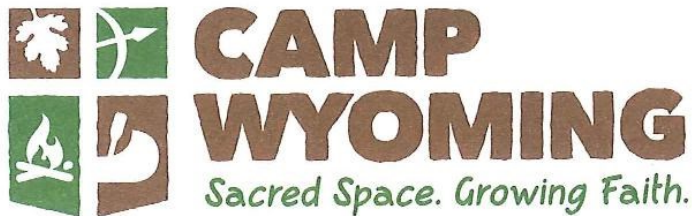

(Sewing Group)

1. Make outfits for our Christ Walk Service and Romans & Christians program.
2. Clean windows in lodges, cabins, Owl's Nest, and Dining Hall.
3. Weed labyrinth.

(Construction Group)

1. Replace 24 windows in 3 cabins in Bird Unit.
 2. Build wall divider in all 8 cabins.
 3. Build firewood shelters for 6 cookout circles and 4 campfire circles.
 4. Replace benches at campfire circles, cookout circles, and chapels.
 5. Build shelving in each cabin.

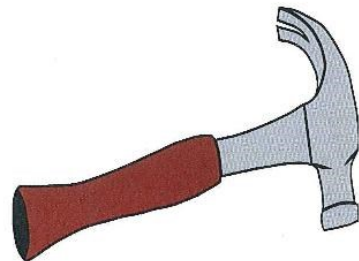

Healthy Women Healthy Families is a year-round, support ministry of the Global Poverty Program of Presbyterian World Mission in collaboration with Presbyterian Women. The fund enables global partners to implement programs that directly impact the lives of the most vulnerable community members. These programs promote health, education and self-development to help alleviate poverty and suffering of women and children. Program include primary and pre-primary education, prenatal and essential obstetric services, trauma healing and psychosocial support, early childhood health and nutrition programs, health and hygiene education, food security and fistula repair surgery.

The S.A.F.E. House class is coming to a close this week. After four weeks of our pilot class, we have talked about what Positive Psychology is and is not, neuroplasticity, building resilience in adults and children, character strengths, and various positive psychology interventions shown to help people thrive. This week will include a time of evaluation of the class, gathering feedback from students and SAFE House leadership. We will also discuss possible topics of interest for any future classes. I will present a report to Mission Team in May describing the pilot class, and seeking the Team's guidance on next steps.

S.A.F.E. House was created in partnership between Canaan Baptist Church and First Presbyterian Church of Champaign in the 1990s as a Christ-centered program to help those struggling with addiction to recover. Twenty-five percent of our CMD funds this year go to S.A.F.E. House.


In sub-Saharan Africa, the largest source of disease is unsafe drinking water. According to UNICEF, one in five children die before their fifth birthday because they lack potable water. Providing water that is safe to drink brings life to the villagers. Safe drinking water means healthier people who can work longer in their fields producing more food resulting in less starvation.

From September 1st, 2015 to the end of November, 2,715 Shallow Wells were built, providing an estimated 407,250 of the extreme poor (244,350 children) with a sustainable source of safe drinking water. Only through your donations and God's blessings can this be done.

The Shallow Well is inexpensive to build and can be placed in the most remote areas. A well can be easily maintained by the local village people and is a necessity even the extreme poor can afford to maintain.

Help us tell this extraordinary story. Churches, Sunday School classes, small groups, families and individuals are the strength and heart of Marion Medical Mission. If you know of anyone who would be interested, please pass along their contact information.

MMM projects directly impact the African people and stress self-help and sustainability.

All U.S. volunteers pay for their living expenses and travel to and from Africa. They work hand-in-hand with those who benefit from our projects.

Sometimes I don't have the best judgment in the world. On one Thursday night I got in the middle of a heated argument and I told one person that they were through for the day. After that one of the people who lives on the streets came up to me and gave me a hug (we hug each other every time that we meet). And he whispered in my ear, "Hon, please don't do that again. We care for you."

We served 99 people last week. Our current needs are deodorant, large, XL, and 2XL men's underwear, and even though it is not winter, we need winter gear as well as volunteers and drivers. To drive you will have to fill out an application. To do so go to The Salvation Army and ask for Melanie.
