#### Say Yes

First Presbyterian is in search for a new wedding coordinator. Wedding coordinators for churches are the ones who work out the details with the family, understanding wedding policies of the church, acting as liaison and in general functioning as a sounding board for wedding service coordination.

Southern Living magazine describes the role of a church wedding coordinator this way:

The wedding coordinator might be the first person a bride contacts after getting engaged. She oftentimes helps book the church, helps schedule the priest or pastor, and gives the couple a tour of the church if desired. During a tour, places such as where the bride room is and where your soon-to-be-husband and the groomsmen will gather before the ceremony are included in the tour. She'll also help figure out a timeline for the wedding day, schedule the rehearsal, and help put together all the elements of the ceremony including readings, music, and procession order.

Additionally, she'll know what décor elements the church already has (candelabras, candles, aisle runners, flower stands, etc.) and help to figure out what kind of rentals and floral arrangements needed. Brides will work with the wedding coordinator as a liaison with the photographer, videographer, florist, and all other day-of vendors. The church has certain guidelines for photography and videography during the ceremony, and the wedding coordinator will relay any pertinent information to them.

The church wedding coordinator will help the bride carry out wishes for the ceremony from the processional order to tutoring ushers on how to greet guests and where to seat them. She'll make sure the bride is out the door and on the way to a night of merriment at the rehearsal dinner as soon as possible—with strict timeline for the next day's church festivities.

#### The Wedding Day

While the bride is getting ready the morning of your wedding, she'll already be halfway through her church wedding coordinator checklist. She'll make sure the door is open for the florist, photographer, videographer, and any other vendor that will need to set up prior to the ceremony.

Once the wedding party gets to the church, the church wedding coordinator duties continue with ensuring the bride room is stocked with plenty of water and tissues. She'll see that the groom, groomsmen, and all other parties are in place. Once it's time for the ceremony to begin, she'll cue the music, the officiant, and everyone involved in the processional. She'll be there to help if any last minute issues arise.

Because First Pres' longtime wedding coordinator no longer has close ties to the church, we are in search of a new wedding coordinator. This position is paid, by the wedding couple, through a fee structure determined by the church.




#### **Contributions**


Contributions in May were \$1K less than in 2018 and \$28K below the budget at \$48K. The Year to Date total is above last year by \$15K but below the budgeted amount by \$5K. These figures include prepaid pledges (those paid in the year prior to the budget year) that are prorated over the year with 1/12 added to each month's contributions. Including all revenue sources, at 41.7% through the year, we have received 46.4% of the expected 2019 revenue.

#### **Expenses**

Year to Date expenses are \$8K below the budget at \$435K and \$6K below 2018. Considering all sources, revenue exceeds expenses by \$43K which is \$9K less than at the end of May in 2018. This figure includes \$32K less in prepaid pledges than in 2018. At 41.7% through the year we have experienced 41.0% of the expected 2019 expenses.







## Southwest Farm Sale Update


The sale of a portion of our church's farm property at the corner of Curtis Road and Learning Lane is expected to be completed this month. This has been a long process involving the City of Champaign's review and approval but will result in an approximately 9 1/2 acre portion of our land being sold to Copper Creek Church for the construction of their building. Approval of the sale of this portion was granted by our congregation in 2017.


Part of the City approval process was the required preparation of legal plats and plans detailing the subdivision of our property and showing that the remaining parcel, that we retain ownership of, can be developed to City standards, consistent with current zoning. The resulting plans prepared by the engineers for Copper Creek indicate that a 42 lot single family subdivision could be built to City standards on our remaining property. We are not required to develop the land in this way, but the City requires that a plan indicating an acceptable development on the subdivided lots be prepared. A scanned copy of the approved Preliminary Plat is included with this Newsletter (see following page). A larger version will be available for viewing in Westminster Hall.

A few weeks ago, an article in the *News-Gazette* described the City's Plan Commission approval of this document. The final approval was given by the Champaign City Council on May 21. All costs related to the engineering and legal work necessary to obtain this approval were paid by Copper Creek Church in accordance with our agreement. Any costs related to their building construction will also be borne by Copper Creek Church including utility and roadway construction required by the City.

The sale to Copper Creek Church will be in the amount of approximately \$570,000. The use of these funds has not yet been identified but will be determined by the Session.

'Till the blue skies drive the dark clouds far away...


I told the students that this is not "goodbye", but "see you later" and encouraged them to stay in touch with their ESL family.
