A Report From the Field: Worship at San Gabriel Presbyterian Church (Georgetown, TX) While on Vacation, Sunday, July 28, 2019

I love Sunday mornings sitting in a pew in the moments before worship. My pew wasn't a pew this week, and the vibe's a little different without an actual pew, but it's close enough. My amply padded chair sat in a long arch of chairs that sliced across a room the length of a roller rink. The architect may, indeed, have had a multipurpose room in mind when he devised these plans, but nixed them when he discovered this community was known for its retirement homes not young families seeking a place to play church league basketball.

Up front behind the chancel, upon the cactus colored walls, hung a rough-hewn cedar cross crafted by an area artist, a stunning and possibly accurate connection to the surrounding hill country dotted with such windblown trees.

At the ends of the room, Jesus' life shone through two bright, colored stained-glass windows. The faces of the characters, however, represented nothing of the diversity of the wider Austin community much less the family of God. On one wall, the children gathered around a smiling Jesus look veritably Scandinavian, perhaps the children of IKEA engineers. And baby Jesus on the opposite wall is the old-school baby on the Gerber baby-food jar; his mom is an Italian film star. At least the choice of wood fit, I thought. Too bad the windows are so astonishingly unrepresentative.

Regardless of the pale faces, the windows are colorful, otherwise, and primary hues warmed the room. So, too, did the pianist's haunting and well-played rift on Amazing Grace, whose lyric was written, need I say it, by a former slave trader.

Our gathering song, *In Christ Alone*, was led joyfully from the chancel by three good singers and the congregation seemed to sing along, never mind the cavernous space that swallowed their sound. The man sitting behind me, a minister's son, sang great harmony; I felt like a rock star singing near him. The lyrics oozed into cringe-worthy 'Me Theology' about how I am 'his' and Jesus is 'mine,' which sounds a little like bragging to me. Confidence, I realize, often may be construed as arrogance. I like more humility and gratitude, mystery and awe in my hymns. Further, to claim Jesus as "mine" feels too exclusive nomenclature to describe the one who came to heal the whole world. Additionally, there was a lot

of Jesus' blood in this song, satisfying the wrath of a just (?) God. Despite its singability, the lyrics troubled me.

What A Friend We Have In Jesus-that old chestnut of an opening hymn—continued the 'me' theme by reducing the sovereign God to offering me personal solace. This is true, of course, but might sound snarky to the curious worshipper who might have slipped in to check out the Presbyterian tribe. I feel completely part of the insiders' club, but I like worship that feels, well, bigger and less exclusive. As we sang, I prayed that all would feel the friendship of God in Jesus, which is why I choose this song, with reservation, from time to time when crafting services of worship.

The excellent prayer of confession—printed for all of us to read together—was the first place my "neighbors" were mentioned and I was glad to be led in a prayer that beseeched God to help me become a better neighbor to all people. This piece of the liturgy was probably lifted out of a prayer book, which lent a feeling of familiarity and timelessness. Barbara Brown Taylor once said that if we preach something new, we are probably wrong—because we preach from a tradition. I am a traditionalist in this sense.

The passing of the peace was a friendly time to wander round and shake hands with immediate neighbors who seemed glad, not obligated, to share the peace of Christ. I was glad the regulars didn't ignore me to shake the hands of their friends. I was treated like a charter memher.

How Great Thou Art offered as a solo after the reading of the Psalm caused me to glance around to make sure I wasn't in a revival tent. Yes, God is great, and this cloying hymn's solid theology underscores that greatness, but I found myself hungering for more refreshing hymnody with which our new hymnal is chock full.

A line of children were led into worship for the deftly crafted Children's sermon. Joyce Gill spoke easily with the children

who were variously in left field but generally polite. She used knock-knock jokes (who's there?) cleverly to remind us that God is always there. It was blessedly brief and focused (when you pray, God's always there listening), and the children were glad to be released and lined up to be marched back out to Sunday school rooms.

I was sorry to see the children go, as a vitality left the room with them. I believe worship is something we do together, and to leave out the children feels wrong. I looked to my left at the window of Jesus welcoming the children and thought he'd agree. We belong together when we pray and praise, and kids only grow into the adult-ish parts of worship when they can practice it over years. And, frankly, because what we do in worship is so absolutely counter cultural, they need all the practice they can get. We all do.

We remaining adults were treated to a well-delivered, thoughtfully prepared sermon that had a beginning, middle, and end. Since I don't get to hear preachers preach often, I relish such opportunities. Bill Peterson seemed more focused on his flock than his notes; sometimes I feel like the preacher is simply reading a manuscript where I can overhear it, instead of talking to me.

I would have preferred the reverend using less 'father' language for God and more parent, creator, and mother-father language. Again, I was thinking about those first-time visitors unfamiliar with the landscape of Reformed worship who might be weirded out by the idea that God is the bearded, old man living in clouds. We all know the God of the cosmos doesn't have genitalia. Since this is true, why do we insist on using mainly gender specific language? (I am often guilty of this lapse.)

I don't mean to split hairs. It simply would have been a shame had a congregant tuned-out an otherwise solid sermon because it used genderized, off-putting language. (Brian Wren's rephrasing of the Doxology used later in response to the offering was a perfect example of how

language about God can be Biblical, fresh, and expansive, eschewing gender specificity. There's a wide array of words to talk about God.)

The pastor led the whole service in a vital, caring manner. He was smooth in a non-slippery way. He seemed an authentic shepherd grateful to be with his flock. I liked being with him. What I'm talking about is 'trust,' and what I felt led me to a feeling that I was in a safe place and the church wasn't selling snake oil. If I were to return, I would need to meet pastor and people face to face and get to know them. Ginny Barksdale opined that ministry is relationship, relationship, relationship, and I have always believed her. This service of worship and the pastor's leadership was a good introduction.

The final hymn—a paraphrase of words attributed to St. Francis of Assisi-reminded me that it's not all about me. Make me an instrument of God's peace so that others may experience God's grace. I was encouraged to be selfless in the manner of Jesus. That was a pretty cool, outwardlythinking way to be sent out into the world hungry for God's Good News and joy.

Illinois Conference of **Churches Supports Recent Statements from National Council of** Churches

The Leadership Team of the Illinois Conference of Churches has signed onto to the following statement from the National Council of Churches. The ICC is the ecumenical body of the state of Illinois with 13 member Christian denominations.

The National Council of Churches opposes the Justice Department's decision to reinstate the federal death penalty and to schedule the execution of five persons. We affirm our longstanding view that the death penalty is both a violation of the dignity and worth of human beings and has also proven to be ineffective as a deterrent (see the 21st Century Social Creed and our statement of September 13, 1968).

Additionally, the pervasiveness of systemic racism and classism intrinsic within the criminal legal process means the death penalty is neither fair nor just. In fact, we know that hundreds of people who have been sentenced to death — or actually executed by the state — have been determined to be innocent. In a time when states are ceasing this abominable practice, it is abhorrent that the federal government would seek to revive it.

Our Christian faith is clear that life and the dignity of human personhood are sacred gifts of God and as such shall not be violated.

Institutionalized killing contributes to the brutalization of society. Such a final and heinous decision should not be left to the discretion of flawed humans and broken systems. Furthermore, society is served better by a system of restorative justice: as all are made in the image of God, we stand firm in our belief as Christians that all can be redeemed.

The Illinois Conference of Churches adopted the following statement of the National Council of Churches. May it guide our prayers.

"Thus says the Lord of hosts: Render true judgments, show kindness and mercy to one another; do not oppress the widow, the orphan, the alien, or the poor; and do not devise evil in your hearts against one another." Zechariah 7:9-10 NRSV

The National Council of Churches urges the Trump administration not to go forward with the widely publicized raids that are intended to round up and deport thousands of families and individuals. Indeed, these raids may very well take place while millions of Christians are attending Sunday services. The raids have struck fear and dread into the hearts of countless people who are living peaceful and productive lives in our nation.

These unnecessary acts of "enforcement" terrorize children, women, and men who live in our communities. It is unconscionable and immoral. We see these threatened deportations as part of a program of extreme intimidation and harm, and we urge the U.S. government not to move ahead with these raids.

This is a moment in which God is calling the Church to do all it can to stand with those who have sought refuge within our borders and to resist these measures and show compassion toward persons threatened with deportation. Many of the congregations associated with the NCC are praying for those impacted and are prepared to act in ways that protect threatened persons.

Since the earliest times in which Christians gathered together, churches have been places of sanctuary in which persons in danger of harm from an oppressive government can find safety and protection. We urge all churches to be places of sanctuary for those in danger today.

People of faith cannot turn a blind eye this weekend and we must rely upon the strength of God, revealed in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ, to accept the freedom and power to resist evil, injustice, and oppression.

Worship Change Coming September 1

Some 20 years ago, our Session elected to hold a third service (beyond the 9 and 10:30 services) due to space constraints at the 9 AM service. The 8 AM service was born, with a contemplative feel and limited music.

Recently, several long-time "regulars" at the 8 AM service came to the Worship Committee to suggest we fold the 8 AM service into the 9 AM service. They noted that at a recent joint service of worship how the energy level was higher and our potential of church growth was greater when we are together. They feared our lower attendance numbers at both the 8 AM and 9 AM service sometimes felt anemic and didn't accurately reveal to visitors and potential new members the true vitality of our congregation.

The Worship Committee after lengthy discussion concurs and recommended to Session for an extended evaluation of combining our energies into one traditional service at 9 AM, with coffee hour and Sunday School for all ages following, then The Gathering Contemporary service at 11:15. Our first Sunday together will be September 1, 2019.

Several of us on the Worship Committee attend the 8 AM service and have loved it. I personally love the piano music that Richard Rossi brings and am asking that this be included in the 9 AM service on a regular rotation.

We do understand that worship time changes do alter people's schedules and routines. Some of you, we know, have Sunday jobs. Change is nearly never fun. We feel the energy and power in numbers will bring a new and renewed vitality to worship that will be well worth the effort, and encourage congregational growth.

Join me, please, in praying that God will continue to guide our steps.

Contributions


Contributions in July were \$8K less than in 2018 and \$15K below the budget at \$61K. The Year to Date total is above last year by \$29K but below the budgeted amount by \$11K. These figures include prepaid pledges (those paid in the year prior to the budget year) that are prorated over the year with 1/12 added to each month's contributions. Including all revenue sources, at 58.3% through the year, we have received 61.1% of the expected 2019 revenue.


Expenses


Year to Date expenses are \$25K below the budget at \$595K but \$1K above 2018. Considering all sources, revenue exceeds expenses by \$34K which is \$3K more than at the end of July in 2018. This figure includes \$32K less in prepaid pledges than in 2018. At 58.3% through the year we have experienced 56% of the expected 2019 expenses.

Southwest Farm Property Sale Update

The sale of a 9.49 acre portion of our property in southwest Champaign, netting the Church \$567,848, was completed on July 11th. Construction of Copper Creek Church's building on this site is underway. This completes the transaction approved by our congregation in 2017. Session will determine the use of these funds that have been placed in our investment account.



So far this quarter they have assisted over 345 unduplicated individuals (59 families), 25 of which were totally new to the agency. The immigrant/refugee/asylee population continues to grow even as the state fiscal situation remains limited.
