


The Heart of Mission

I shared last week that part of the **Pentecost Offering** goes to PC(USA) **Young Adult Volunteers**. I got to hear one of those recipients this week during **Frontera de Cristo's "**Coffee, Conversations and Compassion**." Frontera de Cristo** is the place of mission in Douglas, AZ and Agua Prieta, Mexico directed by our PC(USA) mission co-workers Mark Adams and Miriam Maidonado.

The World Mission Committee met with Mark Adams recently over zoom to get some guidance about an upcoming project. It was at his invitation to all of us that I joined Frontera de Cristo's "Coffee, Conversations and Compassion" the last two Thursdays and found it very interesting. I plan to continue. The Zoom gathering is a bilingual conversation with people from all over the United States and Mexico. The first Thursday I attended, Joca Gallegos, the FDC program coordinator discussed the Ministry of Frontera de Cristo. This past week, the three bilingual, binational interns shared their experience of living in intentional community and what it was like to be in Agua Prieta Sonora now that the Mexican border is shut down. The interns are three females, a Roman Catholic from Chiapas, a Mennonite from Illinois, and a Presbyterian, the Young Adult Volunteer, from Ohio, Bridich, Katelyn and Hannah. They are finding it enriching to learn to use language respectfully, to learn to be flexible in community, and to be filled with hope in their future. Their goals are to live intentionally, in the present and to act on their intention. These are lessons we all can learn from because we all live in community. One Great Hour of Sharing Report: On Easter Sunday we took up the One Great Hour of Sharing offering. I am especially grateful since just recently we received a \$5000 grant from Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (one of the offering areas of the One Great Hour of Sharing Offering) that went to two of our local mission agencies: CU at Home and The Refugee Center. Their new expanded hours at the Phoenix are: Monday-Friday 9-8pm, Saturday and Sunday 9am-4pm. - Our amazing volunteers who have stepped up, and through their service, are allowing us to expand the hours of the Phoenix Daytime Drop-in Center AGAIN! Due to the COVID-19 situation, our friends on the street can now be in our facility 9am-8pm Monday-Friday along with our extended weekend hours!
- To Jesus for one of our female friends who reached out for help several months ago and recently followed up with us to tell us how she is doing. She said that this was her first Mother's Day sober and is so grateful for all she has in life now!

Let us keep all our mission partners in our prayers, those who are waiting to go back to their place of ministry and those who are able to work where they are. Listen for God's call to you in their ministry.
